Message from Interim Pastor John Kuziej

Happy New Year! It is time to put up the new calendar. I have several calendars that are sent to me. I have one from the ELCA World Hunger I hang in my office. This calendar keeps me posted on church festivals and scripture texts for Sundays. Every month I look at a photo showing ELCA Hunger ministries at work. I have a calendar from Thrivent in the kitchen with beautiful nature shots from around the country. I have a calendar from the New Yorker magazine featuring monthly cartoons. This one is in the bathroom where I start my day. It is good to start the day with a touch of humor.

The year 2025 means the start of a new administration in Washington, D.C. Donald Trump will be inaugurated as our 47th President on January 20th. As Christians we pray for the President as Scripture guides: "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. This is right and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires everyone to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth." (1 Timothy 2:1-4). There is a feeling of foreboding when the new president takes office. He and his followers have taken a hard line on immigration--remove by force all immigrants who are in the country illegally. All agree there needs to be immigration reform and hopefully wisdom and compassion will prevail over plans that fail to recognize that immigrants are human beings made in the image of God. It is also a matter of prayer concerning plans of retribution against political opponents. It is disturbing to hear of officials and advisors who have compiled an enemy's list. We pray for our people to have a thirst for God and not revenge.

We need an epiphany or revelation. Check your church calendar for January 6th, the Epiphany of our Lord. The gospel for the day is the well-known story of the Magi or Wisemen seeking the new-born king, Jesus. The Wisemen are Gentiles or foreigners, yet they come to the land of Israel seeking the King of the Jews. They are guided by the star, the light which will lead them to Jesus, the Light of the world. But there is King Herod who does not rejoice because he fears a rival and so hatches a plan of murder. Evil is present in the hearts of some who do not welcome the good news of God's love for all. But it is God's eternal purpose for love to heal the world. This is the reason Jesus was born for us; the light of the world no darkness (evil) can overcome.

The first Sunday after the Epiphany is the festival of "The Baptism of Our Lord". John the Baptist was baptizing folks at the Jordan River, a baptism described as a commitment to repentance for the forgiveness of sins. Jesus was among those baptized, signifying his solidarity with sinners. Jesus knows we all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God. Jesus' baptism reveals his coming among those who have fallen short. He has come not to scold or reject, but to save and reconcile to God. Jesus' baptism was no mistake but an epiphany of grace we celebrate. As we hear in the baptismal service, "We give you thanks, O God (for) at the river your Son was baptized by John and anointed with the Holy Spirit. By the baptism of Jesus' death and resurrection you set us free from the power of sin and death and raise us up to live in you."

The festival of the Baptism of our Lord is an epiphany for us, a revelation about our own baptisms. We have been baptized into Christ Jesus, receiving the full benefits of his death and resurrection. Baptism is never in the past tense, but always present thanks to the gift of the Holy Spirit who ever reminds us of whose we are, the beloved children of God. Every day is a new day to live for Jesus. Every day we celebrate we are forgiven and that nothing can cancel that or separate us from the love of God. Every day we pray for ourselves and the world around us. Every day we cry for help, so we do not succumb to ungodly ideas that degrade other human beings. Every day we pray for the privilege of living for Jesus through deeds of love and mercy. Every day we pray, thankful for Jesus who lifts us from discouragement, and even despair so the beauty of creation is

made clear, and the beauty of fellow human beings made clear because they are sisters and brothers Jesus died for to save and make new.

I recall a church basement where there was a table displaying a variety of devotionals with the sign, "Help Yourself". A young lady spotted a Bible and asked if she could have it. "Certainly", was my reply. She was happy because the only other Bible she had was one of those large, heavy family Bibles. She told me her favorite book of the Bible was 'Revolution'. I told her, "I think you mean the book of Revelation." But to say Baptism makes for a revolution in our lives needs no correction. In this new year some folks made what they call "New Years resolutions" that are often set aside over time. But instead of half-hearted resolutions, we are part of a revolution due to Jesus' full-hearted love for us. Our baptism into Jesus is our revelation of a revolution. May the Holy Spirit guide you to be part of Jesus' revolution, a revolution of compassion, mercy, love, and peace.

Action – Motion/Second/Carried... Approved the Council Meeting minutes from October 9th, and Special Council meeting minutes October 13th, 2024. Unanimous.

Pastor's Report:

- Attended ELCA Boundaries Training on Thursday, November 7.
- Will attend local ministerial meeting at St. Augustine on Thursday November 14. Will discuss Thanksgiving Service and Blue Christmas Service.
- Created a "Plan B" for Sundays not able to lead worship (due to weather or health). Will have a prepared sermon in the office by Thursday before the service that someone can read. Another possibility would be to read the lessons and have a hymn sing.
- Pulpit Supply:

EQUITY CHALLENGE

In Matthew 18:1-5 the disciples ask Jesus who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Jesus responds by calling a small child forward encouraging them to be humble like a child because humble folk are the greatest in God's view. In Luke 18:16 Jesus tells the disciples to "Let the children come to me...for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven. We say we value children in our culture, thinking of them as innocent and trusting. The culture in Jesus's time viewed kids as inferior, without status, treated as property, not respectable.

Taken together, these verses tell us being like a child means giving up pretensions of self importance, independence and self reliance, and trusting God for we are all God's beloved children. God helps us abandon our quest for what we think gives us status, and God helps us accept our place as members of the family of God as a given, where all are ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven.

People of color are reminded every day of their status in our culture, being fined more heavily in court for a traffic ticket, stopped for shoplifting out of proportion to population, women getting off an elevator before her floor when a black man enters, not being given credit for ideas, told an apartment is no longer available. and so many other daily insults.

When my five year old multi-colored grandchildren and I went to a playground, a white boy asked Amanuel, my chocolate skinned grandson, "How can you be brother and sister?", referring to his white, redheaded sister. This is an honest, innocent question given the few opportunities for close relationships between white and blacks. Amanuel replied, "I am from Ethiopia; she is from here." Implicit in his answer is a rejection of having a status less than his sister and a strong statement of his accepted membership in his family, and the family of God. Of course, multi-racial adoptions are not without challenges as when the first time the boys were at a black barber shop for their first haircut in the United States, their sister, seeing the picture of black Jesus on the barber shop wall, says "Jesus isn't black!" Being from the mideast, Jesus was halfway between black and white. As we notice pictures of Jesus, what color is he?

In the current Epiphany season, we see the Christmas baby born in a lowly manger, enter adulthood, and later end his life as he began, vulnerable and without status. In between that, he teaches us that all people are our neighbors and we are all members of God's family.
